

My colleague Phil is so good at statistics. He's the CEO of spreadsheets.

It's my job to buy the snacks for the office. I guess you could say I'm the CEO of snacks.

Ugh, I've lost my fourth pair of sunglasses this month. I'm the CEO of losing things.

#### **Beth**

So, 'the CEO of' isn't a serious title. In fact, the CEO of social media wouldn't be the actual CEO, that's chief executive officer, of a social media company. It would just be someone who posts on social media a lot.

I reckon we are the CEO of making podcasts. What do you think?
