### What Is a Sentence?

A simple sentence is a group of words that:

- · expresses a complete thought
- · has a subject and a verb
- · has an object and/or other information after the verb

SUBJECT	VERB	OBJECT	OTHER INFORMATION

### The subject:

- · is the person or thing that does the action
- · can be a noun or a pronoun

### The verb:

- · shows the action or state of the subject
- · is sometimes an action word, such as go, speak, write, swim, or watch
- · is sometimes a non-action word, such as be, like, want, or need

### The object:

- · receives the action of the verb
- · can be a noun or a pronoun

### Sentences with the Verb Be

**Be** is a very common verb in English. It has three forms in the simple present: *am*, *is*, *are*. Be is never followed by an object. Here are three common sentence patterns of be.

### Subject + Be + Adjective(s)

### Subject + Be + Noun(s)/Noun Phrase

### Grammar: Expressing Place and Time

A prepositional phrase is a group of words that:

- · begins with a preposition, such as at, in, or on
- · includes a noun or pronoun, called the object of the preposition

A prepositional phrase of place tells about location. It answers the question Where? We usually put it at the end of a sentence.

We eat a lot of salad at home.

The computer is on the desk.

Loretta lives in my house.

A prepositional phrase of time tells about time. It answers the question *When?* We usually put it at the end of a sentence. It often goes after a prepositional phrase of place if both are present.

Michelle reads the newspaper in the morning.

She sees him at the bank on Mondays.

A time word or time phrase also answers the question When? and can come at the end of a sentence.

Eric watches TV daily.

Marco works every afternoon.

If you start a sentence with an expression of time, it is common to use a comma.

In the spring, everyone has finals.

Today, we have an important meeting.

Twice a week, Teresa volunteers at the library.

Here are some common ways to express place and time.



### Combining Sentences

Some writers like to keep their sentences short because they feel that if they write longer and more complicated sentences, they are more likely to make mistakes. However, longer sentences connect ideas, and this makes it easier for the reader to understand.

Study these sentences. The important information is circled.

Every sentence has an important piece of information. The most important information from each sentence can be used to create longer and smoother sentences. Notice how the ideas in the shorter sentences are combined in these longer sentences.

My friend is a science student at the university.

I have a friend who studies science at the university.

A word or word form may change or be omitted, but no ideas are changed or omitted. Remember that there is usually more than one way to combine sentences.

### Peer Editing

A good way to make sure that your writing is clear is to let someone else read it and make suggestions. Other people may notice things that you missed.

After you check your work, it is helpful to have a peer check it. A peer is someone who is equal to you, such as a classmate. When a peer edits your writing, it is called peer editing.

This is what usually happens in peer editing:

- 1. A peer reads your writing.
- 2. Your peer gives you suggestions and ideas for making your writing better.
- 3. You listen carefully to what your peer says.
- You think about making the changes your peer suggests. If the comments are negative, remember that the comments are about the mistakes in your writing, not about you.





A paragraph is a group of sentences about one topic or idea. It has four main parts:

- · an indented (moved in) first line
- · a topic sentence that gives the main idea
- · a body of sentences all about the main idea
- · a concluding sentence



## Mechanics: The Title of a Paragraph

A title gives the reader information about what is in a paragraph. A good title:

- · tells the main topic, but does not tell about everything in the paragraph
- · is usually short—sometimes only one word
- · does not have a period at the end
- · does not begin with My Paragraph
- · follows special capitalization rules

The capitalization rules for titles are:

- · always capitalize the first letter of the first word
- · only capitalize the first letter of the important words in the rest of the title

## Parts of a Paragraph: The Topic Sentence

A good paragraph has a topic sentence. The topic sentence:

- · tells the main idea of the whole paragraph
- · is often the first sentence
- · should not be too specific or too general

If a paragraph does not have a topic sentence, the reader may be confused because the organization of ideas will not be clear.

## Parts of a Paragraph: Supporting Sentences

Every paragraph must have sentences that support the topic sentence. These sentences make up **the body** of the paragraph and are called **supporting sentences**. They:

- · give more information about the topic, such as details, examples, or reasons
- should not include ideas that are unrelated or unconnected to the topic

#### Changing Celsius to Fahrenheit

Changing temperatures from Celsius to Fahrenheit is not difficult. First, multiply the Celsius temperature by 9. Then divide this answer by 5. When you finish, add 32 to your answer. The result is the temperature in Fahrenheit. Most countries report temperatures in Celsius, but the United States reports them in Fahrenheit. For example, if the Celsius temperature is 20, you multiply 20 by 9. Then you divide the answer, 180, by 5. The result is 36. If you get a different number, check your math mistake. Next, add 32, and you have the correct Fahrenheit temperature, 68. Now you can easily change a temperature from Celsius to Fahrenheit.

## Grammar: Possessive Adjectives

When you want to talk about something that belongs to someone or something, you can use a **possessive adjective**. A possessive adjective answers the question *Whose?* as in *Whose house?* Whose books? and Whose television?

A possessive adjective comes before the noun that it describes.

- · ends the paragraph with a final thought
- · often expresses the same idea as the topic sentence using different words
- · does not give any new information about the topic



The **simple present** is one way to discuss the present. It is very common in academic writing. We use the simple present to describe:

- · regular activities or habits
  - Dr. Jones begins his days by visiting patients. Carla drinks two cups of coffee every day.
- · facts or things that are generally true
  - Earth revolves around the Sun.
    The people of Iceland are friendly and helpful.
- · a process (how to make or do something)

Next, the artist prepares his materials. Finally, the delicious meal is ready to serve.

- in a consonant + y, change the y to i and add es (cry  $\rightarrow$  cries)
- in a vowel + y, add s (play  $\rightarrow$  plays)

The verbs have, do, and go have irregular -s forms.



## Grammar: Using A and An or Ø

A and an are called indefinite articles. We use articles with nouns.

There are two types of nouns in English: count and non-count. Count nouns can be counted. They have a singular form (phone, person) and a plural form (phones, people). Non-count nouns are not countable. They have only one form (money, information).

A singular count noun cannot stand alone. We use an article or another word before it, such as this, that, or a possessive adjective (my, your, his, etc.). Use:

- a or an before a singular count noun when its meaning is general (not specific)
  - We want to buy a house in the future.
- a before a singular count noun that begins with a consonant sound
  - a break / a dream / a horse / a uniform
- · an before a singular count noun that begins with a vowel sound
  - an animal / an engineer / an honor / an uncle

When there is an adjective before a singular count noun, use the beginning sound of the adjective, not the noun, to choose a or an.

- ✓ Our friends attend an excellent school.
- X Our friends attend a excellent school.

We do not use a or an before plural count nouns or non-count nouns.

- ✓ Computers are part of everyone's life. (Ø article)
- X A computers are part of everyone's life.



## Grammar: Complex Sentences with Time Clauses

When you write, sentence variety will make your writing more interesting. Good writers use both simple and compound sentences.

John played tennis. (simple sentence)

John played tennis, and he was good at it. (compound sentence)

There is another way to add variety to your writing: **complex sentences**. A complex sentence consists of two clauses: an independent clause and a dependent clause. A clause is a group of words that includes a subject and a verb.

ind clause dep clause

Joe listened to music after he watched TV. (complex sentence)

An independent clause can be a sentence by itself. A dependent clause cannot be a sentence by itself. It must be connected to the independent clause. If it is not, it is a fragment.

- ✓ Before he bought a car, John rode his bicycle to work.
- Before he bought a car. John rode his bicycle to work.

In a complex sentence, the dependent clause starts with a connector called a subordinating conjunction. Subordinating conjunctions such as *after*, *when*, *as soon as*, and *before* show the time order of events in a sentence. Dependent clauses that start with these time word connectors are called time clauses.

Be going to and will are used to talk about the **future**. They often have little or no difference in meaning. The future forms are less common in academic writing, but we use them to:

- make predictions (guesses about the future) and discuss expected results
   The community is going to/will benefit from the new park.
   The chemical is going to/will change the liquid to a bright blue color.
- talk about plans and proposals
   The president is going to/will meet with several world leaders on his trip.
   Many grocery stores are going to/will sell this new product.







### ELEMENTS OF GREAT WRITING

### The Importance of Sentence Variety

**Sentence variety** is important in writing. Using compound and complex sentences in addition to simple sentences will make your paragraph more interesting.

Compare the following paragraphs. Both contain similar information about tennis terms. However, the paragraph in Example 2 reads better because there are a variety of sentence types.

#### **EXAMPLE 1**

#### Tennis Terms

Tennis has many special terms. They are used to discuss the game. Some people do not know the meaning of these special terms. They are not familiar with tennis. One special word is *love*. Love means "nothing" or "zero" in tennis. All tennis matches begin with a score of love-love. Deuce is a special word. It means the score is even. It means each player scored three points. This means the score is tied at 40. One other special term is volley. A volley means hitting the ball before it touches the ground. It comes from the French word volée. Volée means flight. Love, deuce, and volley are special terms. All tennis players and fans know these special terms.

An adjective clause:

- · has a subject and a verb
- · describes a noun (just like an adjective does)
- · often begins with who or that
- · usually comes directly after the noun it describes







# **ELEMENTS OF GREAT WRITING**

## Listing

Writers often organize their ideas in **lists**: by number, time, or importance. A topic sentence for a paragraph with listing order often includes a phrase such as *many types*, *several reasons*, *three steps*, etc.

There are several reasons for the recent increase in sales.

All new students must go through four steps before they can register for classes online.

In this kind of paragraph, it is important to signal the order of ideas with sequence words and phrases. Here are some common sequence words and phrases for listing.

First/Second/Third	Last	A/An/One (reason/example)
Next	Finally	Another (reason/example)
Then	The first/next/last (reason/example)	In addition

First, next, then, last, finally, and in addition are adverbs and often come at the beginning of a sentence followed by a comma (except for then).

First, passengers buy a ticket.

Next, they go through the gate.

Then they wait for the train.

With one (reason/example), the next (reason/example), and another (reason/example), do not use a comma.

The next reason to read is to increase your vocabulary.

## Responding to Ideas

Students in academic classes often need to respond to or give their opinion about something they read, watch, or discuss. A **response paragraph** is usually about a topic that people have strong opinions about. There are typically three types of responses: agree, disagree, and a mix of both.

A response paragraph should have:

- · a topic sentence that states your opinion
- supporting sentences that give reasons and examples to support your opinion
- · a concluding sentence that summarizes your opinion or offers a suggestion

#### WRITER'S NOTE Avoiding Plagiarism

Writers often use facts to support their opinions. If a fact is well-known and written about a lot, you can use it in your own writing without citing or referring to the original author. However, if a fact is not well-known or written about a lot, then you need to cite the original author in your paragraph to avoid plagiarism. Plagiarism is a serious offense.

#### Reducing Time for Physical Education

Many U.S. elementary and high schools are **reducing** the time students have for physical education during the school day. They are doing this to give students more time to **focus** on academic work and to invest' in more academic subjects. People who agree with this action say students need to spend more time preparing for national tests. In addition, they **argue** that not all students like to take physical education classes. They say that students who like exercise can **join** an afterschool sports program. However, people who disagree with this action say that not all students can access activities outside of school. 



### Possessive Pronouns

A possessive pronoun takes the place of a possessive adjective + noun combination. Possessive adjectives + nouns and possessive pronouns can be in the subject or object position.

# Quantifiers

Quantifiers give more information about the number, or quantity, of a noun. They usually go in front of a noun.

You can also use more than one adjective from the same category. Put a comma in between these adjectives, or use and. Use and when the adjectives follow a linking verb.

She is a shy, quiet girl. She is a shy and quiet girl. She is shy and quiet.

### **PREPOSITIONS**

# At, On, and In

Prepositions indicate time, location, and direction. Prepositions are always the first word in a prepositional phrase, which is a preposition + noun.

Three common prepositions in English are at, on, and in.

### Using At

**Location:** Use at for specific locations.

Angela works at the First National Bank.
I always do my homework at my desk.
Joel met Jillian at the corner of Polk Street and Florida Avenue.

Time: Use at for specific times.

My grammar class meets at 9:00 a.m. every day. The lunch meeting begins at noon. Cate does not like to walk alone at night.

Direction: Use at for motion toward a goal.

My brother threw a ball **at** me. The robber pointed his gun **at** the policewoman.

### Using On

Location: Use on when there is contact between two objects.

The picture is **on** the wall. He put his books **on** the kitchen table. Erin lives **on** Bayshore Boulevard.

Time: Use on with specific days or dates.

Our soccer game is **on** Saturday. Your dentist appointment is **on** October 14. I was born **on** June 22, 1988.

### Using In

**Location:** Use *in* when something is inside another thing.

The books are **in** the big box. I left my jacket **in** your car. Barbara lives **in** Istanbul.

Time: Use in for a specific period of time, a specific year, or a future time.

I am going to graduate from college in three years.

My best friend got married in 2006.

Mr. Johnson always drinks four cups of coffee in the morning.

We will meet you in ten minutes.

# Other Prepositions

Here are more common prepositions and prepositional phrases of location. In the chart on the next page, the preposition or prepositional phrase shows the location of the ball in relation to the box.

# Connectors in Compound Sentences

Connectors in compound sentences are called coordinating conjunctions. They are used to connect two independent clauses. A comma usually appears before a connector that separates two independent clauses in a compound sentence.

Many writers remember these connectors in compound sentences (or coordinating conjunctions) with the acronym FANBOYS: F = for, A = and, N = nor, B = but, O = or, Y = yet, and S = so.

# Connectors in Complex Sentences

Connectors in complex sentences are called subordinating conjunctions. They are used to connect a dependent clause and an independent clause. Use a comma after a dependent clause when it is at the beginning of a sentence.

# **EDITING YOUR WRITING**

One way to improve your writing is to ask someone for feedback. Another way is to check your own work. You should read your work to make sure that it:

- · responds to the assignment
- · has a title
- · has a topic sentence
- · has sufficient supporting sentences
- · has a concluding sentence
- · is free from errors

This section will help you become more familiar with how to identify and correct errors in your writing.

# KEEPING A VOCABULARY JOURNAL

Vocabulary is very important to learning English. The best way for you to really improve your vocabulary is to do more than study from your teacher or this book. You should also keep a vocabulary journal.

A vocabulary journal is a notebook in which you write down all the new words and phrases that you do not know but you think are important. When you find a new word, write it in your notebook. However, writing words in the notebook is not enough. You also need to review the words many times.

The most important thing about learning vocabulary is the number of times you think about the word, listen to it, read it, speak it, or write it. You can practice any way you want.

There are many ways to organize a vocabulary journal, and you should choose a way that you like. It is important to remember this is your journal, and it should be useful for you. Here is one way to keep a vocabulary journal. You write four pieces of information about each new word, but you can write as little or as much as you want.

- 1. Write the English word first.
- 2. Write a translation in your first language.
- 3. Write a simple definition or synonym in English.
- 4. Write a phrase or sentence with the word. Use a blank (\_\_\_\_) instead of writing the word.

With these four kinds of information, you can practice the new vocabulary four ways.

Leave a lot of white space between the words and the information you write. Each page of your notebook should have only five to eight words. As you learn new information about the word, you can write that information in the white space.

# TEST TAKING TIPS

Here are some useful tips for taking timed writing tests.

### Before Writing

- Before you begin writing, make sure that you understand the assignment. Underline key words
  in the writing prompt. Look back at the key words as you write to be sure you are answering
  the question correctly and staying on topic.
- Take five minutes to plan before you start writing. First, list out all the ideas you have about
  the topic. Then think about which ideas have the best supporting examples or ideas. Use this
  information to choose your main idea(s). Circle the supporting information you want to
  include. Cross out other information.
- Write on the assigned topic. Do not write more than is requested. If the assignment asks for a 150-word response, be sure that your writing response comes close to that. Students do not get extra points for writing more than what is required.

### While Writing

- Be sure that you have a strong topic sentence. Remember that your topic sentence guides
  your paragraph. If the topic sentence is not clear, the reader will have difficulty following your
  supporting ideas.
- It is important for your writing to look like a paragraph. Be sure to indent the first sentence.
   Write the rest of the sentences from margin to margin. Leave an appropriate amount of space after your periods. These small details make your paragraph easier to read and understand.
- Organize your ideas before you write. Review the list you have created. Place a number next to
  each idea, from most important to least important. In this way, if you do not have enough time
  to complete your writing, you will be sure that the most relevant information will be included
  in your paragraph.
- Once you pick a side (agree or disagree), include only the ideas that support that side.
   Sometimes you may have ideas for both sides. If this happens, choose the side that is easier for you to write about. If you do not have an opinion, choose the side you can write about best, even if you do not believe in it. You receive points for your writing skill, not your true personal beliefs.

### Word Choice

- Avoid using words such as always, never, all, and none. You cannot give enough proof for these
  words. Instead, use words such as probably, often, most, many, almost never, and almost none.
- Avoid using general or vague vocabulary. Words such as nice, good, and very can often be
  changed to more specific terms, such as friendly, fabulous, and incredibly. Be more specific in
  your word choice.
- · Avoid slang and informal language in academic writing.

### Development

Avoid information that is too general. When possible, give specific examples. Good writers
want to show that they have thought about the subject and provide interesting and specific
information in their writing.

# After Writing/Proofreading

- Leave time to review your writing. Proofread your paragraph and check for subject-verb agreement, correct use of commas and end punctuation, and for clear ideas that all relate to the topic sentence.
- Check for informal language like contractions or slang. These do not belong in academic writing.


